

Workshops

The Sexual Health team has been providing a new selection of workshops for the LGBT+ community. While STI awareness and sexual health education is important, we've been creating spaces for individuals to reflect on their 'sexual biography' and what they want (or don't want!) from sex in their lives. "[The workshop] helped me to think about my childhood experiences from a new approach and understand how they shape my current feelings about sex today."

<u>The criminalisation of HIV</u> <u>transmission - time for change?</u>

What effect does language and law have on how people living with HIV are perceived? In April we were delighted to host a talk by Dr Max Morris, who has recently published an article in the Journal of Criminal Law calling for the decriminalisation of HIV transmission. Prosecutions for the 'reckless' or 'intentional' transmission of HIV still occur in the UK and ideas of 'innocence' and 'guilt' are often used in the media when HIV is talked about. Dr Morris is a Lecturer in Criminology at Kingston University whose research and teaching focus on gender and sexuality, including the criminalisation of sex work, homosexuality, and HIV. He lives with HIV and was a participant in the PARTNER study. The talk was followed by a robust discussion where service users shared differing perspectives with passion and respect.



"Coming Out Lockdown – Sexual Health" session to British Red Cross service users

PASH delivered a group session titled "Coming Out Lockdown – Sexual Health" to British Red Cross services users. The group was very diverse with people from Sudan, Eritrea, Syria, Iran. During the session we discussed several subjects regarding sexual health, such as HIV combination prevention, STI's, COVID and sexual health. We also mapped and explored current sexual health services and the proximity to service users. The service users really appreciated the session, one commented "Great session, you're very clear (in conversation). Another commented "Thank you for all the great information."

It was explained during the session that PaSH offers advice and information in a more private way if the attendees felt it was needed. Ways to access to free condoms and lube and Home HIV tests via PaSH website were also explored. Just an hour after the session a participant requested a coaching session, on how to use a condom and another requested condoms.

<u>COVID Vaccines:</u> <u>Your questions answered</u>

Many people living with HIV have questions about getting a COVID vaccine: Is it safe? Was it developed too quickly? Will it affect my HIV medication?

We were honoured to be joined by Dr Liz Okecha, a

Sexual Health & HIV Consultant, for a Zoom seminar. Together we explored our service user's questions and concerns about COVID vaccines, giving people all the information they needed to make an informed decision. Topics covered included how the vaccine works, how they were developed at speed, whether vaccines interfere with HIV medication, side effects and accessing COVID vaccination as an asylum seeker or overstayer. Following the session, attendees reported improved knowledge and confidence in COVID vaccines.
